The total distance is 19 miles one

way, or 38 miles return. Those wishing to do less can turn around at any time. This route is not a loop.

Please bring your own lunch and don't forget passport or similar identification for the border crossing into Canada. Sun. Oct. 12 will be the rain date.

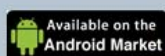


Missisquoi Valley Rail Trail Mobile App Released!
